## Five Generations of Food Service

## The Ah Chee and Sai Louie (Chan) Families of Auckland.<sup>1</sup>

Chinese takeaways became part of the New Zealand diet after World War 2, and since the 1990s there has been an explosion of Chinese restaurants. But the New Zealand Chinese community has a much longer history of running restaurants. This article traces brothers *Chan Dar-Chee* and *Chan Yun-Gee*<sup>2</sup>, and four generations of their descendants (who took the surnames *Ah Chee* and *Sai Louie*) who have cooked and sold food to Aucklanders. The history of Chinese New Zealanders is often framed in terms of the discrimination they faced and the 'self-segregation' they practiced. <sup>3</sup> The family members in this article all served 'European' food, which illuminates an often-overlooked aspect of the history of New Zealand Chinese entrepreneurship: that they always operated within the mainstream business community. <sup>4</sup>
